The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2019.

OBJECTS, PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES AND ORGANISATION

The company's objects are:

- (1) To preserve and protect the physical and mental health of the residents living within any area(s) within the boundaries of NHS Greater Glasgow & Clyde ("the Operating Area"), and to assist in the relief of ill health and the provision of health education for such residents.
- (2) To promote training in skills of all kinds, particularly such skills as will assist residents of the Operating Area in obtaining paid employment or will promote personal development.
- (3) To promote, establish, operate and/or support other schemes and initiatives of a charitable nature for the benefit of the community within the Operating Area.

We do this by:

- Promoting and supporting networks of local services and projects which pro-actively work towards better health and wellbeing outcomes for all;
- Helping local people and volunteers build capacity, increase confidence and self-esteem, and their own sense of wellbeing;
- Supporting engagement in, and the uptake of local health and social care services and facilities by individuals and groups;
- Working in partnership to develop local service provision in response to local need; and,
- Encouraging and supporting community activity which may lead to participation in social, economic and cultural activity and better neighbourhoods.

When it is complementary to the charity's objects, the charity is guided by both local and national policy.

GOVERNANCE STRUCTURE

The organisation is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 24th February 2004 [No. 263896], and registered as a charity on 16th March 2004 [SC035288]. The company was established under a Memorandum and Articles of Association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is being governed under its Articles of Association. In the event of the company being wound up members would be required to contribute an amount not exceeding £1.00.

North Glasgow Healthy Living Community is managed by a Board of Directors. The maximum number of directors shall be 12 of which there will be no more than 8 member directors. There are 4 places available for member directors. The organisation can recruit a maximum of 4 appointed directors. The Board meets a minimum of 8 times per year.

The Board seeks to recruit directors to represent the interests of the charity. This includes identifying those willing to become members and use their own skills, knowledge and experience to assist the charity including recruitment of community residents.

All directors of the company are also trustees of the charity in accordance with charity law and there are no other trustees.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable Activities

Since April 2013 North Glasgow Healthy Living Community (NGHLC) has been contracted by NHS Greater Glasgow and Clyde to deliver programmes of community-based health improvement under the brand of Axis (formerly Axis Health Hubs) with another Glasgow-based Healthy Living Centre.

Operational areas are located within Glasgow City Health & Social Care Partnership (HSCP) neighbourhoods across North East and North West Glasgow sectors.

One further Axis programme area, Wyndford Maryhill, been funded for the past 6 years through Glasgow City Council's Integrated Grants Fund (IGF).

The work of North Glasgow HLC and the Axis programmes is complementary and additional to existing local activities, and enhances working relationships with local organisations and service providers, as well as facilitating new linkages and joint working.

The Axis programme of activities is shaped around key themes and priority areas;

- Community engagement and involvement;
- Food and health programme; and
- Community capacity building including volunteering.

Axis Programme Delivery

During 2018/19, with our Axis partner, activities and engagement took place in 6 Glasgow City Thriving Places areas, and 3 other local programme areas:

- NE Glasgow: Barmulloch/Balornock; Camlachie/Dalmarnock; Easterhouse, Springboig/Barlanark; and Royston (a new Axis area from January 2019).
- NW Glasgow : Drumchapel; Milton/Lambhill/Cadder; Possilpark/Ruchill, and Wyndford Maryhill

Action Plans, set out each year for NGHLC delivery team members, detail the services of the charity which include health improvement activities such as healthy eating courses, family programmes, physical exercise activities such as tea dances and eco group projects, community events, and capacity building programmes. Six-week cookery courses, demonstration workshops, and training and learning courses also formed part of core activities.

Programmes engaged individuals most disadvantaged and furthest from local services. In 2018/19, some area programmes and targets continued to focus on early engagement (new clients) but as some areas developed Axis worked with groups and volunteers to support capacity building, development, community-led action.

North Glasgow Healthy Living Community's Axis programme successes over 2018/19 included: 2,221 programme attendances involving 477 adults. Throughout the year 1,433 adults from one of 21 local events registered and engaged in at least one activity or training programme.

Many local residents were first-time engagers, and in 2018/19 family programmes increased in popularity, including 'Family Meal & Movie' events – a successful means of helping to combat food and financial poverty whilst bringing families together.

Additional successes included 46 new volunteers, 52 local residents engaged in training, and 31 adults who completed a new Volunteering Tasters Programme in NW Glasgow.

Throughout the year waiting lists grew - 346 adults registered in 2018/19.

Partnership Working and Thriving Places

Partnership working is at the heart of our work. North Glasgow Healthy Living Community supports and encourages referrals to and from local partners. Across neighbourhoods we work to ensure that opportunities for local people are maximised in terms of a holistic approach to tackling disadvantage, and supporting positive health and wellbeing. Barriers to engagement are removed, and access afforded to a range of opportunities to promote connectivity in ways that aim to best suit service users.

Two areas of partnership working developed over the year which made significant impacts on local people, partners and areas:

1. The new Axis 'Volunteering Taster Programme' in the Lambhill/Milton and Ruchill/Possilpark Thriving Places areas - 64 meaningful partnerships in action which included programme referrers and/or host organisations, and;
2. The role of 'Community Anchor' for Lambhill/Milton/Cadder Thriving Places and the 'hosting' of the post of Community Connector. Glasgow City Council funded this process with £49,500 from the Integrated Grants Fund.

Future Developments

- Towards the end of 2018/19, Glasgow Housing Association (GHA) awarded NGHLC a small pot of funding (£3,000) to research and develop an idea around involving local people to address loneliness and isolation in communities around multi-storey living. A base has been identified at 160 Charles Street, Royston.

The HSCP North East Glasgow has shown early partnership interest by embedding some developments within the NHS community health improvement contract for Royston.

- In the current economic climate where we are aware of the continuing challenges facing voluntary organisations we anticipate cut backs to public spending and subsequent reductions, or loss of funding streams. Although the organisation holds healthy reserves at this time, we aim to target a more diverse range of funding and partnership opportunities in line with the objects of the charity.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

The principal activity of the charity continued to be addressed throughout the past year through the delivery of health and well being activities. The trustees consider that the performance of the charity this year has been satisfactory, with targets achieved and funding secured for the coming year.

The Board keeps the financial position of the organisation under constant review through the operation of the Contracts Management Team and at meetings of the full Board. The financial environment has continued to prove unstable and uncertain over the last few years: major sources of funding have been reduced by - in some cases - quite substantial sums, and the range of our sources of funding has been constrained. The organisation has however been successful in retaining its principal funding sources albeit at much reduced contract values, requiring a change in the scope and range of the organisation's activities.

The Board, through its Project Manager, continues to seek out less traditional sources of funding but which remain within the core objectives of the company. Working in partnership with other similar organisations is in the opinion of the Board a realistic and current strategy in order to achieve funding streams which might otherwise be beyond our reach. The Board reviews opportunities as they arise.

The Board of Trustees continue to review the major risks which the charity faces; the principal risk being a loss of funding on which the charity is highly dependent. To provide for a continuation of at least short term operations in the event of adverse conditions, the reserves policy is kept under review and is stated in the following paragraph. The trustees have also examined the operational and business risks faced by the charity and confirm that they have established systems to mitigate the significant risks.

There are a number of areas outwith our control, for example, funding decisions. Grant makers very often do not confirm the level of funding until the very last moment. To allow us to plan effectively we need to know no later than 9 months into the financial year what level of funding we will have for the following year. The ideal situation would be to secure funding partner commitment to strategic planning which would mean securing funding for 3-5 year periods.

RESERVES POLICY

The Board has recognised the need for a detailed reserves policy and aspires to hold in general unrestricted reserves a minimum six months operating expenditure in the event of a reduction in income. Six months running costs based on the accounts to 31 March 2019 equates to £216,831 and at balance date the charity held £227,834 in its General fund. The board is therefore satisfied that this policy is being met.

The charity has built up unrestricted funds over several years, and holds minimal restricted funds at the end of each year, as these tend to represent grant income which is expended during the year. At balance date, the charity held total funds of £760,978 as follows:

INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT
ON THE UNAUDITED ACCOUNTS TO THE DIRECTORS OF

I report on the accounts of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2019 which are set out on pages 9 to 15 and the accounting policies set out on page 11.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The charity's trustees (who are also directors of the company for the purposes of company law) are responsible for the preparation of the accounts in accordance with the terms of the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended). The charity trustees consider that the audit requirement of Regulation 10(1) (a) to (c) of the Accounts Regulations does not apply. It is my responsibility to examine the accounts as required under section 44(1) (c) of the Act and to state whether particular matters have come to my attention.

Basis of independent examiners' statement

My examination is carried out in accordance with Regulation 11 of the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended). An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the charity and a comparison of the accounts kept with those records. 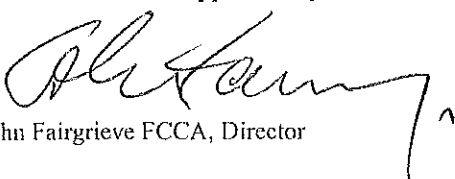

North Glasgow Healthy Living Community received payments from the NHS under an extended contract which expired on 31 March 2018. North Glasgow Healthy Living Community pays a proportion (1/3rd) of the NHS contract payments to Annexe Communities in accordance with a Partnership Agreement, to deliver services within North East and North West Glasgow areas.

9. RELATED PARTIES

During the year there were transactions with NGM Accountants Ltd, a director of whom is also a trustee of the charity. This is in respect of provision of Sage support and amounted to £420. (2018 - £378). There are no other Related Parties or Connected Persons.

10. PRIOR YEAR ADJUSTMENT

During the course of the preparation of the charity's accounts for the year ended 31 March 2019 the trustees became aware that expenditure had not been correctly allocated in the prior year giving rise to an incorrect balance brought forward on restricted funds. As at 31 March 2019 the charity held restricted funds totalling £5,895 which related to specific projects and expenditure in 2018/19. The effect of correcting the allocation of expenditure in the 2017/18 accounts has been to decrease restricted funds carried forward at 31 March 2018 by £16,592 and increase unrestricted funds at that date by the same amount.

11. DESCRIPTION OF FUNDS

General Funds - The unrestricted, free reserves of the Charity

Fixed Assets - Represents the net book value of the Charity's tangible fixed assets

Innovation Fund - A fund established for the development of innovative ideas and funding opportunities

Sustainability Fund - A fund established for strategic purposes including future business growth

Redundancy Fund - A fund established for redundancy costs in the event of closure or cessation of projects

Property Fund - A fund established for relocation and/or refurbishment costs on termination of current lease

IT & Telecommunications Fund - A fund established for future upgrading or replacement of telecommunications systems

Equipment Replacement Fund - A fund established for upgrading and replacement of equipment

Vehicle Fund - A fund established for the purchase of vehicles and associated costs
